NCP-Beyond Barriers

NCP named 2013 Best Places to Work by Business First

Every year the Buffalo Business First holds the "Best Places to Work" competition, open to companies throughout WNY.

NCP was nominated for the first time in this year's competition, which included 177 companies. The judging process takes many weeks and includes confidential employee satisfaction surveys, agency data, unsolicited employee comments and so on.

Our agency was elated to learn that we were honored as a "Finalist" in our category, exemplifying the excellent workforce we have at NCP!

This fantastic honor is the direct result of a remarkable staff that we are very proud to say are NCP employees!





NCP's new TV Show, "NCP – Beyond Barriers", taped its first show in late 2013.

Each month, the show highlights aspects of our agency and topics related to the field of developmental disabilities. The half-hour shows include guest interviews and on-location footage showcasing our many programs, fundraiser, events, etc.

"NCP-Beyond Barriers" is broadcast on Lockport Cable TV

(LCTV) Channel 20 at various times each week. A production team of NCP employees comprise the group that tapes, edits, and prepares each telecast.

GetSET Project

NCP is honored to be selected as only one of two WNY agencies serving individuals with intellectual disabilities to be part of the new two-year GetSET ("Success in Extraordinary Times") project. This initiative is jointly funded by The Peter and Elizabeth J. Tower Foundation, the John R. Oishei Foundation, and the Health Foundation for Western and Central New York.

The goal of the two-year project is to strengthen and enhance the agency's internal and external systems to better prepare it for future changes. The intensive work involved with the project is led by two organization development consultants funded by the project. Work on this initiative imparts all aspects of NCP's operation and will involve staff throughout our agency, as well as our Board members and other partners of NCP. The project will run through December 2015.

NYS Cerebral Palsy Association Conference

Each fall CP of NYS conducts a two-day conference for approximately 800 participants from across the state, as a forum for the exchange of information and for the introduction of new ideas and technologies.

Attendees also hear issues important to people with disabilities, their families and the people and organizations providing support and services.

Agency Programming

Educational Services Niagara Children's Education and Treatment Center (NCETC)

During 2013, the preschool began the process of completing a Preschool Regional Need written request, which the first step of developing a new program modification for children who have IEPs.

The program also looks to obtain approval to add a fourth full day Special Class. Looking forward, the program plans to develop two additional full-day classrooms.

There was also a significant increase in CPSE multidisciplinary evaluation services of almost 50% between 2012 and 2013.

The school building gained increased security as the project initiated with grant funds from IDEA was completed.

Vocational Services A rehabilitative partnership, person to person, one step at a time.

The goal of the vocational division is rooted in the development of community relationships and helping program participants connect and establish friendships.

The Sheltered workshop began working with NU on literacy assistance, technology instruction assistance, grad class participation, and on-site Day Hab.

ACCES-VR and OPWDD job placement services were implemented, including Intensive Supported Employment, Enhanced supported employment, employment training, and youth employment.

Many individuals volunteer with community organizations as a way to make a difference in their community. In 2013, our relationship with these organizations included work with the Salvation Army's home delivered meals program, the SPCA of Niagara, area soup

kitchens, food and clothing drives, serving as "bell ringers" for the holidays, and helping with other special projects throughout the year. This year, some people also began volunteering at a local church.

Individuals enjoyed many outings, events, and community experiences including holiday parties, the Annual Fall Talent Show, and cooking groups. For the 3rd straight year, more than 50 bowlers, including staff members, went head to head in the program's Wii Bowling league.

NCP offers the only full day special education classroom in Niagara County



The mission of the CRVC is to offer people with disabilities an array of quality services that will promote community integration, choice and independence.



Buffalo Avenue's Day Hab program received a generous donation of \$5,000 from the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo to create a Sensory Room, including a massage, music vibromatic recliner chair.

The area was designed to offer a quieter and more private area to work on individual goals and participate in Day Hab activities. The Sensory Room offers an area for relaxation and quiet time for those who may be having a bad day or just need a break from the commotion of the workshop.

Service Coordination Achieving Greatness; one step at a time

The MSC serves more than 200 individuals every year through community based assessments, environmental modifications, and other services. 2013 was highlighted by the program's largest collaborative effort to date, an environmental modification for 16-year-old Matthew Minderler.

A Lew-Port High School honor student, Matthew aspires to be a computer program designer. A diagnosis of Scoliosis and Spinal Muscular Atrophy - Type II, a degenerative neuromuscular disease resulting in extreme muscle weakness and degeneration of the spinal motor neurons, confines him to his home, often his bedroom, where he requires the use of a ventilator, feeding tube, and 24-hour medical care.

Through special accommodations and technical support, Matthew is home tutored and pursuing a Regent's diploma. Every day, the kitchen was rearranged to accommodate Matthew, his tutor, school supplies, and computer, making for a very tight squeeze. Matthew's bedroom was cluttered from his medical equipment, hospital bed, and nursing care supplies.

After an extensive collaborative effort between Leigh Colangelo, Matthew's Service Coordinator at NCP, governmental and community agencies, and community volunteers, and eight revisions, renovation plans were developed. Renovations included a ramp extension off the existing wheelchair ramp, installation of a second exit for emergency evacuation, and installation of a wider bedroom door, creating a master suite. This layout accommodates Matthew's medical equipment, overnight nursing staff and supplies, and hospital bed, as well as creating a designated tutorial and recreational area.

In addition to his newly personalized bedroom, care of the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the room gave him a greater autonomy, more self-worth, and more independence, a key focus of service coordination. The five-month project was completed in November 2013.

Residential Services *Promoting Independence and Friendships*

The individuals who live in NCP's residences participate in many recreational outings in the community, including shopping, movies, concerts, sporting events, and dining at local eateries.

Residents were treated to camping at Grand Island KOA.

NCP supports individuals of all ages with any type of disability, whether its autism, neurological disorders, intellectual disabilities, cerebral palsy, or seizure disorders



This year, the residential Division organized fundraising opportunities in the community to fund special items, activities, and outings for the program.

In September, we held a bowling night at Bowl-A-Drome in Niagara Falls. Individuals from our residences and vocational programs joined the teams in the lanes.

Staff also organized other fundraisers throughout the year, including the Mother's Day hanging basket sale and fashion show.


Clinical Services

In 2013, the Article 28 Clinic made changes to operations, including collaborative efforts with Aspire and Mt. St. Mary's Hospital.

The clinic began operating under Aspire of WNY's operating certificate. There was an increase of approximately two-percent (2%) in patient visits as compared to 2012.

In addition, NCP's collaboration with Mt. St. Mary's Hospital brought 80 new patients to the clinic. Altogether, more than 125 new patients were seen during 2013, double the number of new patients seen in 2012.

Overall, the clinic saw a significant increase in the number of new clients; approximately 50-percent.




