# NCP, Affiliates Receive BIP Funding

The New York State Office for People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) announced grant awardees of Balancing Incentive Program (BIP) Transformation Funds. These address barriers intellectually and developmentally disabled individuals encounter in the changing system of care. This includes access to non-institutional long-term services and supports such as housing, employment, self-directed care, and also, the efficiency of individual service provider's infrastructure.

A total of 133 grants adding up to \$65 million were awarded to 103 organizations.

Cerebral Palsy Association of NYS, which includes NCP and its 24 affiliates, were awarded \$730,000 to develop and improve care coordination systems to ensure data management, billing, IT, best practices, and other administrative functions, are in place to meet the needs of both those receiving services, and the requirements of a managed care environment.

NCP, along with Aspire of WNY, Suburban Adult Services, Inc., and Community Services for the Developmentally Disabled, received a grant for \$350,000 for trainings to earn certifications through the Council on Quality and Leadership (CQL). Staff will gain the skills to effectively identify and track Personal Outcome Measures (POMs), goals developed with and around an individual's achieving the highest quality of life possible in different life areas. It also ensures an individual an active role in his or her care.

#### **Vocational News**

The Vocational Division received a \$25,000 donation from the Gary Hall Foundation of Greater Buffalo Funds to renovate its Day Habilitation location. Improvements included new carpeting, new office chairs, chairs and tables for the program room, two couches, eight lounge chairs, and a 60" flat screen TV!

On November 17, 2014, ten individuals from CVRC also began an "on campus" computer/job prep class at Niagara University. Students learned about different computer parts, computer skills such as typing and Microsoft Office, and, most importantly, internet safety and online etiquette. The Career Awareness portion of the class includes job interest surveys, application and resume building, interviewing skills, and expectations in the workplace. After completing this class, the goal for these individuals is to enter Supported Employment.

The vocational division kept busy throughout the month of December, participating in community outings and activities including the Niagara Falls Power Project's Annual Tree Decorating, attending Palace Theatre's Christmas classic, "Scrooge" and "Holiday Pops" at Kleinhan's Music Hall, making ornaments and other Christmas crafts, choir practice for the Christmas party, baking Christmas cookies, going to "Breakfast with the Barrys", and a New Year's Eve Party.

On December 12, CRVC's Annual Christmas Party was held at Antonio's Restaurant. people came for breakfast and 130 for lunch. Everyone enjoyed the food, music from the CVRC Choir and DJ, Santa, karaoke, dancing, gifts, and the company! Thank you to Board Members Larry Morehouse and Dan Vitch who joined us for the lunch and to Executive Director Jeff Paterson who stopped by to wish everyone a Merry Christmas.

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The Division was also awarded a \$26,770 grant from the East Hill Foundation, \$2,000 grant from the Guillemont Memorial Fund, and given a generous donation from Univera Healthcare for \$3,200 toward its playground resurfacing project helping us reach our goal! Staff also raised more than \$750 for the project by volunteering at races through Eclipse Multi-sport!

For more than 10 years, middle school students from St. Peter's School have come to the ETC, and worked with the children on different activities, as part of a big community service field trip done during Catholic School's week. Students participate in various community service activities throughout the year, gaining a varied experience by the time they graduate from St. Peter's at the end of 8<sup>th</sup> grade. Both St. Peter's and ETC's students have a great time during these visits.

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On February 17th, the clinic's dental hygienist, Linda Lewis, began going to different classrooms teaching students about dental care. She provided students with goodie bags and demonstrated how to brush their teeth using a large tooth brush and Ollie Mutt, shown on page 4. Many of the students took their turn brushing Ollie's teeth, and listened as she read stories.

In addition, teachers participated in a training on CHOMPERS! Bringing Dental Care to Kids, through the Community Child Care Clearinghouse of Niagara. The training introduced dental education curricula for young children. In addition, teachers received classroom materials, including books such as *The Tooth Book* by Dr. Suess, timers to ensure proper time is spent brushing, craft ideas, adaptable songs, giant teeth, and toothbrushes.

In 2015, I want to get myself ready for my next big step. I'm old enough to be on my own, and my goal is to get an apartment and live with a roommate to help pay expenses."
