With 2018 upon us, it's a great time to look back at this past year. We're immensely proud of the work our staff has done to assist the individuals we support and the important difference they make in their lives.

It's been a year that has seen the start of two amazing new programs. In the spring, we started the Learning to Achieve Self Reliance (LASR) program. The program, based on Community Habilitation funding, aims to assist individuals in making the transition to living on their own in the community.

In the fall, we launched the Learning, Education, and Academic Development (LEAD716) program, which is designed to provide early intervention services to young children who have been exposed to lead. Lead exposure is a leading cause of both learning disabilities and attention deficit disorder. Each of these endeavors opens new opportunities for LDA, and their impact will continue to be felt far into the future.

We're also working to make an impact on some of the most important issues facing our field. Through participation in the statewide bFair2DirectCare (Be Fair to Direct Care) campaign, we were able to secure funding for much needed pay increments for our Direct Care Staff.

With all of this growth, the agency is hiring for a number of direct-care positions in our Habilitation, Residential, and Vocational Departments, as well as Literacy Volunteer Tutors for LEAD716. 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# **DDAWNY Holds Legislative Luncheon**

The Developmental Disability Alliance of Western New York (DDAWNY) held its annual Legislative Breakfast on December 1st. Attended by self-advocates, service recipients, family members, service provider representatives, legislators and staff, and members of the media, the event was an opportunity to share comments and concerns about issues facing the field.

This year, talking points included lack of housing, public transportation, and jobs for individuals in the community. According to DDAWNY, 11,000 New Yorkers are on waiting lists for groups homes/independent living. Speakers also discussed the planned relocation of the Children's Psychiatric Center from West Seneca to the grounds of Buffalo Psychiatric Center, the lack of easily-accessible, centrally-located regional office, and the rate of pay for direct support professionals (DSPs).

In 2017, DDAWNY started a state-wide #bFair2DirectCare Campaign in an effort to secure a living wage for the caregivers who are taking care of individuals with disabilities (see #bfair2directcare rally write-up on page 3). The current vacancy rate is over 30% in WNY and across the state. Average salary wages for DSPs are well below the federal poverty level.

# People First Care Coordination to Integrate OPWDD Supports and Healthcare Services

A new initiative, People First Care Coordination, will integrate the I/DD supports individuals receive with services provided by interdisciplinary teams of nurses, nutritionists, physicians, behavioral health professionals, and other health and wellness providers. These individualized, holistic Life Plans comprised of supports and services, will be based on the federal Health Home program and coordinated and delivered by regional networks of providers called Care Coordination Organizations (CCOs).

All individuals currently receiving service coordination from a Medicaid Service Coordinator (MSC) in New York State will be eligible for People First Care Coordination. Enrollment for individuals is expected to begin in July 2018.

OPWDD is holding several informational webinars on the conversion through June 2018. Powerpoints and recordings of past sessions, along with opportunities to register for future webinars are posted on the OPWDD website at <a href="https://opwdd.ny.gov/opwdd\_services\_supports/care\_coordination\_organizations">https://opwdd.ny.gov/opwdd\_services\_supports/care\_coordination\_organizations</a>.

Objectives of this transition include comprehensive care management, care coordination and health promotion, comprehensive transitional care, individual and family support, referral to community and social support services, and use of health information technology to link services.

# **LEAD716, Starlight Studio Receive Grants**

The LDA of WNY's LEAD716 program received \$2,573 from the Kelly for Kids Foundation to provide healthy snacks and books to children (and families) during its mentoring sessions.

LEAD716 is a free program aimed to provide critically-needed early academic intervention, via in-home mentoring, to preschool children in WNY diagnosed with elevated lead levels in their blood. Mentoring focuses on early literacy skill development and helps ensure the children are prepared for success in kindergarten and beyond.

Children exposed to lead are at greater risk of lower IQ and learning disabilities, speech and hearing difficulties, attention problems, and behavior issues. The program focuses on helping kids before they enter school — before they encounter learning problems — at an age when they are more resilient.

Starlight Studio and Art Gallery received four grants: \$1,200 from FANA of WNY to work with youth in the agency's transition program, \$1,500 from Erie County for a Chapbooks project through its writing group, \$2,000 from Young Audiences of WNY/Art Partners in Learning to conduct a third installment of *Widening the Focus: Finding Dignity and Acceptance in Difference,* in which artists work with students at Buffalo's Waterfront School, and a \$5,000 Decentralization (DEC) Community Arts/Arts Education grant from Arts Services Initiatives of WNY, for its *Show Time* project, which will pair Starlight Artist Dana Graap with playwright Beth Geyer, to write a script. Geyer's theatre company will produce the play and stage it at Alleyway Theatre in November 2018.

# #bFair2DirectCare Rally

BFair2DirectCare Rallies are taking place across New York State to bring attention to the amazing work that's being done, and to get direct service professionals (DSPs) the living wage they deserve.

On December 19th, individuals with developmental disabilities, their parents and caregivers, elected officials, and civic and community leaders joined #bFair2DirectCare at the Buffalo Museum of Science.

The goal of the #bFair2DirectCare campaign is to remind state leaders that DSPs are "agents of the state who need a fair rate of pay," given the significance of the job they're performing, according to Executive Director of Interagency Council for Developmental Disabilities Agencies (ICDDA), Tom McAlvanah. At December 4th's Brooklyn rally, he said, "On any given day, 24/7, DSPs are there to provide guidance and support needed to assist people with developmental disabilities and their families. It is that valiant and skilled work force who we champion today."

After letter-writing campaigns, lobbying, and state-wide rallies, Governor Cuomo included funding for DSP pay increases in the 2017-2018 budget: \$55 million to be released January 1st, and another \$55 million in April, meaning a 3.25% pay increase for DSPs effective January 1st, and another April 1st, a 6.5% total pay increase in 2018. Cuomo set out additional future increases over the next six years.

# **Service Learning**

The LDA of WNY had the opportunity to work with several undergraduate and graduate-level students at Canisius College, Buffalo State College, and University at Buffalo (UB) this past semester. Coursework included business writing, fundraising, and public relations writing, focused on a variety of community agencies, including the LDA of WNY.

Groups from Professor Miller's Communications Literacy in Business class at UB developed projects related to a new LDA of WNY volunteer handbook, along with revamped forms and policies.

According to Miller, the experience provided students with insight into the importance of communication in the workplace, and experience collabora-

tively solving actual communication problems, and the role that effective communication plays in facilitating that work. It was a great opportunity to work with students and get fresh insight into the organization!



# **Starlight Studio Kicks off 2018 Exhibitions**



Structure, Scape, Utensil is the first of Starlight Studio and Art Gallery's Side by Each Exhibition Series, featuring original work by artist Heather Swenson, and Starlight Artists Ricky Hogan and David Feickert. The opening reception is Friday, January 12, from 6-9 PM at Starlight Studio, 340 Delaware Avenue, Buffalo, NY 14202. The exhibit will be on view through February.

Within a multidisciplinary practice of making screenprints (*Undertow*, featured at left), sculptures, and installations, Swenson creates work that is both derived from experience and invention. According to Swenson, "regarding everyday visual experiences as research, I am extremely captivated by the simple act of looking. I combine these observations with imagined structures and shapes, referencing real spaces I encounter...Through observing, sorting, and making, I hope to navigate the influx of imagery and experiences in my life and create a space for observation and imagination to collaborate."

Feickert's work brings to mind scientific and medical imagery like the electroencephalogram and the electrocardiogram. He enjoys exploring various materials, particularly a combination of drawing and painting on different surfaces.

According to Hogan, his inspiration for creating art came from when he was young and he, "would look through a telescope at the stars and make up stories about life in other galaxies." Drawing spaceships and aliens, creating leather billfolds and wallets, or dressing as a clown while working at a carnival, Hogan has let his imagination guide his creative impulse. Using a rolled paper art called quilling, he's created intricate designs, interesting images, and even jewelry! As a published poet, Hogan uses his poems to express his feelings about his environment and the humans and others who populate it.

# **LEAD716 Seeking Tutors**

The LDA of WNY is looking for Early Literacy Volunteer Tutors for its LEAD716 program, which provides critical early academic intervention to preschool children in WNY diagnosed with elevated levels of lead in their blood. Literacy Tutors will be trained in a curriculum developed by the National Center for Learning Disabilities, as well as, other activities to address the specific needs of enrolled children, including: focusing on early literacy, social, and emotional development, encouraging family involvement, providing instruction to children individually or in very small group sessions in the child's daycare, preschool, or home, and modeling appropriate behavior to children as well as nurture positive relationships, self-esteem and a positive attitude toward learning.

# Lead poisoning affects thousands of children in WNY. It can have permanent and devasting effects on their lives, families, and communities. TOGETHER, WE CAN HELP.

Dear Friend of LDA of WNY,

Every year in Erie County, thousands of children under the age of six are diagnosed with elevated blood lead levels. Thousands more are exposed to lead hazards in their homes.

Children exposed to lead are at greater risk of:

- · Lower IQ and learning disabilities
- · Speech and hearing difficulties
- Attention problems and behavior issues

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), "Children with developmental delays or at high risk for developmental delays benefit most from interventions that start at an early age....No safe blood lead level in children has been identified."

LDA of WNY's new program, LEAD716, is working to minimize these negative effects on a child's cognitive ability, during a critical time in brain development:

- LEAD716 is a free program aimed to provide critically-needed early academic intervention to preschool children in Western New York diagnosed with elevated lead levels in their blood.
- LEAD716 mentoring focuses on early literacy skill development and helps ensure the children are prepared for success in kindergarten and beyond.
- LEAD716 focuses on helping kids before they enter school before they encounter learning problems — at an age when they are more resilient.

It is our hope that, through LEAD716, children in Erie County who have been affected by lead will lead healthier, more successful lives.

At LDA of WNY, we believe that every individual, even those with disabilities, can be successful at school, at work, in relationships, and in the community. Our goal is to ensure such opportunities exist. We have made progress, but the the journey isn't over. As long as children are in need, we won't stop advocating for them.
